Figure 1 shows a diagram of this chemical cell.





Figure 8 shows a graph of the voltage produced by a chemical cell as it is used in a torch for many hours.



Figure 3 shows how the voltage of a simple chemical cell can be measured.



This is because water is the only product from the reaction of hydrogen and water. This water can be used on the space craft as drinking water. Chemical cells will become obsolete when reactants have been used up, therefore more chemical cells will be needed and the waste cells will take up valuable space on the space craft (6)
